Family Services of Peel continues to work in a diligent fashion to ensure that the needs of our community are being met. With over fifteen programs being offered in Peel Region, the agency has endeavoured to continue to enrich and transform the lives and needs of the diverse community that we are proud to call home.

Our employment service programs have expanded to include the Youth Opportunities Program, providing numerous services to youth in our community to support them in their pursuit of employment. Through workshops, job coaching, and ongoing interaction with fantastic employers who recognize the value of the program, but more importantly see the value of investing in the youth of today to support them on their employment journey, we have witnessed successful outcomes from the program.

An unfortunate reality that impacts upon all communities is Human Trafficking, by

the exploitation of vulnerable women and men. Family Services of Peel recently received funding for three years to address this heinous crime. We have been conducting research and literature reviews to assist in developing a solid knowledge base as we work to address this international issue. We were invited to appear as witnesses by the House of Commons' Standing Committee on Justice and Human Rights to discuss our work thus far in this area of Human Trafficking.

We recognize and sincerely appreciate our dedicated volunteers, our staff, and our funders, whom without their support, we would not be able to serve the diverse community of Peel.

Accountability

Effective December 2017, Greenspace (evidence based tools to improve mental health treatment outcomes) was integrated into our Counselling Program and by the end of the fiscal year, 89 clients were enrolled, with a 93% therapeutic alliance.

In compliance with Ontario Regulation 299/10 of Quality Assurance Measures applicable to MCSSfunded services/ supports for adults with developmental disabilities.



Highlights

- In partnership with Peel Health, the Prenatal Fathering initiative prepares expectant fathers for their new role as parents, and assists new parents in their transition from couple to family. During the fiscal year, 561 people (dads, moms, and supporting persons) attended 42 classes in Brampton, Meadowvale, and Mississauga.
- A Prenatal Fathering facilitator was also provided to Peel Health's Supper Club, which serves teen mothers-tobe.
- **378** clients received services from Legal Aid Ontario/Duty Counsel.
- F&ST cycles were run at **8** schools, of which 4 were new to the program.
- During the fiscal year, Family Services of Peel shared its meeting rooms/offices to the following organizations:




