He has seen the rough side of every system. Education – Justice – Housing – Shelter. The RESULT? He is not able to read and write. He lives on the streets as he fears the horrors of shelters. As a homeless person, he dances with a dangerous drug addiction and has been imprisoned due to poor choices. The REASON? He is living with a developmental disability and mental health challenges while trying to survive... in the classroom, in the community, and on the streets. No wonder he ended up in jail.

The **MIRACLE** is found in people. A VERY supportive mother and a strong team of service providers (Central West Network: Support and Justice Coordinators, CMHA, Family Services of Peel, and John Howard Society) came together to problem solve and the results? TRANSFORMATIVE!

He now has a basement apartment which he calls home. Family Services of Peel's (FSP) Adult Protective Service Workers, with the assistance of family donations, helped him set-up and get a fully furnished apartment. He was so thrilled to finally have a safe place to sleep.

This home has become HIS haven, where there is no partying or friend visits... just a truly safe place! He is keeping scheduled appointments with his CMHA counsellor. FSP provided him with a tablet, which allows him to meet virtually, oneon-one with a tutor, who is teaching him to read and write. FSP also provides him with counselling, which when completed satisfactorily, will result in the charges being dropped, thanks to the work of his Justice Coordinator.



The Miracle of Perseverance

Sometimes when we get stuck, we lose our confidence. This was the case with a recent newcomer and young mother who contacted us by phone.



The aura of frustration and defeat was evident as the client talked about her love of teaching children, her challenges migrating with her young child, the lengthy accreditation process as a teacher, her personal employment search, landing her a job at Tim Horton's, followed by a weekly contract position at an insurance company.

The client's stress stemmed from the fact that her employment and financial stability were not secure, so she connected with Family Services of Peel's Employment Services Program.

Although nervous, she participated in a virtual meeting and discussed her career goals with a Career Coach. She was encouraged to attend a RBC Insurance Information Session, and the positive experience piqued her interest.

A lack of experience lessened her enthusiasm but the Career Coach helped her to identify her transferable skills (which employers highly value), and provided guidance on updating her résumé.

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Miracle on Whittle Road

Let me ask you a question. Do you believe in miracles? Or, more appropriately, do you consider, that in today's scientific era, it is illogical to set common sense against the unexplainable? Let me guess, you're sitting there trying to make up your mind. Don't worry, you're not alone. In the 1700s, Scottish philosopher and historian David Hume, did

not believe either. According to him, "A miracle is a violation of the laws of nature; and as a firm and unalterable experience has established these laws, the proof against a miracle, from the very nature of the fact, is as entire as any argument from experience can possibly be imagined."

This quote summarizes today's consensus: miracles are impossible because they violate the laws of nature, and the very nature of these laws dictate that they are inviolable. But are they? Let's see...

Christmas was going to be a struggle for Connie. A single mom with two teenagers, she worked two part-time jobs while also taking college courses at night. She hardly had the money for Christmas dinner and presents. So, when she got home one night and saw a beautiful Christmas basket on her porch, it felt like a gift from heaven. But who sent it? Was it a miracle?



During his first medical check-up, little Fabrice from Togo was diagnosed with a tongue tie. With help from someone, they took Fabrice to the local hospital and for less than £8, his tongue was fixed. Today, Fabrice can speak normally and has lots of friends to play with.

I think that both cases are miracles as these families would say that what they experienced seemed like a MIRACLE. Derived from the Latin "mirari", to wonder. We wonder at an event that is not explicable by natural causes alone and a reported miracle excites awe because it appears to require, as its cause, something out of the ordinary.

We need these types of miracles as they tend to strengthen faith in our world, in our humanity, and in ourselves. Let us be that **MIRACLE** for someone, for a family this season.

Marijoy's Food Blog

Miracle on Whittle Road -**Holiday Treat!** The holidays are meant for delectable treats. As a lover of everything sweet, cookies are one of my favourite pleasures, and I want to share this enjoyment with the following yummy recipe. But first, a back story. I actually ordered a dozen of assorted unique flavoured cookies from a local business and fell in love with the Nutella and peanut butter creation. After searching online to recreate it, I combined a couple recipes and added my own twist, which birthed this beauty of a dessert. This recipe will "bake" your cookie dreams "crumb" true!

What you will need:

½ cup Nutella | 24 bite sized pieces hazelnuts | 1¾ cups all-purpose flour | 1 tsp baking soda | ¼ tsp baking powder | ¼ tsp fine salt | 1½ sticks unsalted butter (room temperature) | ½ cup granulated sugar | ½ cup light brown sugar (packed) | ¾ cup peanut butter (creamy or crunchy) | 1 large egg | ½ tsp vanilla



How to make these pockets of deliciousness come to life:

■ Place 24 tspsized scoops of Nutella onto a parchment lined baking sheet and insert a piece of hazelnut in the middle.

Freeze until solid (about an hour).

- Preheat oven to 350°F. Line large baking sheet with parchment paper or foil.
- In a large bowl whisk together the flour, baking soda, baking powder, and salt.
- In another large bowl, use a mixer to beat the butter and sugars until smooth. Beat in the peanut butter until it is fully combined. Whisk in the egg and then the vanilla. Gradually add the flour mixture.
- Drop 2 tbsp-sized balls of dough onto the prepared baking sheet, spaced approximately 2" apart.
 With your hands, break each ball of dough into two pieces and

- place a tsp of frozen Nutella in between. Form the dough around the Nutella, making sure the edges are sealed. Then, slightly flatten the dough. For festive cookies, you can always use cookie cutter holiday shape imprints (while making sure not to break into the cookie too much for the Nutella to be visible).
- Bake for about 12 minutes or until slightly browned. Allow the cookies to slightly cool before enjoying these pockets of goodness.

These cookies are soft yet chewy (with a little bit of crunch, if you opted for the crunchy peanut butter) and slightly crumbly, while the Nutella and hazelnut filling is gooey, perfectly sweet, with a nice salty surprise. Nutella and peanut butter, definitely a match made in spreadable heaven! Give these MIRACLE cookies a try. Santa will definitely thank you! Stay safe and happy eating!
