Peel Institute on Violence Prevention



Root Causes of Fear, Violence and Trauma

- > The Lost Crone and Matriarchy (500 years of witch hunting)

Galeano Eduardo: Memory of Fire, Trilogy of Genesis (The Inquisition)

By order of Satan (1682 – Remedios)

Canada: Racism and Colonialism

"Take the Indian out of the child"

- A century-long government campaign to eradicate Aboriginal culture and language so that Aboriginals could be absorbed into mainstream society.
- Nearly 150,000 children went through 90 schools across the country, which were run by the Catholic, Anglican, Presbyterian and United churches from the late 1800s until the 1960s, when the government began running them itself. The last of the schools was shut down in the 1980s.



Fear

- > The only emotion that controls men effectively is fear.
- Fear of God's imaginary hellfire. A good man is a fearing man.
- Children must have the "fear of God" put into them or they will grow up to be criminals or worse.

Root Causes of Fear, Violence and Trauma What is Trauma?

- "The word "trauma" is used to describe experiences or situations that are emotionally painful and distressing, and that overwhelm people's ability to cope, leaving them powerless. Trauma has sometimes been defined in reference to circumstances that are outside the realm of normal human experience. Unfortunately, this definition doesn't always hold true. For some groups of people, trauma can occur frequently and become part of the common human experience.
- In addition to terrifying events such as violence and assault, we suggest that relatively more subtle and insidious forms of trauma—such as discrimination, racism, oppression, and poverty—are pervasive and, when experienced chronically, have a cumulative impact that can be fundamentally life-altering."

- Trauma is the result of terrifying events which disrupt a person's sense of predictability and safety in the world. In the field of mental health, "trauma" refers to an experience (single event or ongoing experience) that is emotionally painful, distressful, or shocking, and which often results in lasting mental and physical effects.
- Women who had been abused in their intimate partner relationships had more headaches, back pain, sexually transmitted diseases, urinary tract infections, appetite loss, abdominal pain and digestive problems, gynecological, chronic stress related, central nervous system and total health problems (Campbell et al, 2002).
- Around the world women and their families are experiencing violence and trauma in armed conflicts or displacement through natural disasters or war. The complexity of trauma originating from country of origin violence and disasters is particularly significant for Peel. Immigrants make up 43% of the Peel population and 60% of Peel's population now live in a household that is headed by an immigrant. Poverty complicates this picture as recent immigrants in Peel are more than three times as likely to live below the poverty level compared to the total population (23% vs. 8.7%). How this history is reflected in the organization of services today:

- Services are linear, crisis oriented and short-term
- Services are organized in silos without much coordination and communication among them
- Demographic characteristics of the population are poorly collected
- Services are still organized and delivered according to the average male, white, middle class individual



To rescue women's intellectual gifts

- Mathematics (original meaning "mother wisdom")

Women must say "no" more often

Women's most feared power over men, is the power to say no.

- To refuse to take care of men.
- ➤ To refuse to service them sexually.
- > To refuse to buy their products.
- > To refuse to worship their God.
- ➤ To refuse to love them.
- Every rapist knows that sex can be forced, but no power in the world can force love from any woman who wishes to withhold it.
- Men may talk complacently of their conviction that God loves them; but in reality, what they need in their daily lives is the love of women. If it is denied, most men feel somehow incomplete as human beings. This is why nearly all the patriarchal rules for feminine behavior aim at immobilizing each woman in the service of a man, so she can have no economic, sexual, or intellectual freedom to say no.



Men need to get involved

- > Male identity in patriarchal society is in a state of crisis
- ➢ What does it mean to be a man?
- What are the expectations "we" have of men?
- Sexuality and male sexual assault survivors
- "Sexual identity questions and sexual dysfunction are commonly reported consequences of sexual assault for victimized men." (Tewksbury, 2007)
- > The "talking cure": frank disclosure
- > Emotions that were once impossible to tolerate become tolerable



Services need to be reorganized

- Collect demographic to develop services that respond to the needs of the racialized population of Peel.
- Establish system of services with strong communication and coordination strategies (referral loops)
- Understand and apply the Social Determinants of Health and Well-Being in the Organization of Services
